Historic Preservation Microloan Fund Announcement from PAWV

In late November, the Preservation Alliance of West Virginia announced a new Microloan Program. The Historic Preservation Microloan Program was created to preserve West Virginia's architectural heritage and stimulate community revitalization through advocacy, lending, technical assistance, and development in historic areas in the state of West Virginia.

Danielle Parker, Executive Director of PAWV, hopes that the microloan program will allow people to take action in saving buildings before it is too late. "I receive many phone calls from people asking for help, and they have to wait months for deadlines and grant processes to take place. It is my goal that the microloan can be used to stabilize buildings while the owners plan and apply for larger funding and tax credits."

Loan amounts range from \$2,500 to \$10,000, repayable over a 24-month term with a 2% fixed interest rate. The loan fund's primary target market are those seeking to save an Endangered Property or those who are developing a commercial property that, when redeveloped, will lead to the creation or retention of jobs, new housing units, or other heritage related commercial activity in a commercial downtown district.

A big thank you to the Snowshoe
Foundation! The Appalachian Forest
Discovery Center received a grant from the
Snowshoe Foundation for their upcoming
exhibit about public lands in the
Appalachian Forest National Heritage
Area. Public lands in the area have heavily
influenced the people who live here by
providing jobs, lumber for homes, a
sustainable environment, hundreds of
recreational activities, and more.

The summer 2020 exhibit will explore this connection to public land by examining the different agencies that manage the land and their missions as well as the multiple uses the land provides to locals and visitors. The money provided by the Snowshoe Foundation will allow the Discovery Center to produce a higher quality exhibit with more interactive elements.



Without public lands, we could not have a National Heritage Area. Hunting is a major part of our culture and other outdoor sports; city parks and picnics, public lands encourages a multi-use of shared resources. We have major partners with the federal agencies working with public lands & conservation, as well as partnerships with the state forests in WV and MD. Conservation is a major part of our mission. Public lands allow us to preserve and protect historic sites as well, like civil war battlefield state parks and native american settlement areas.

This grant will also allow the Discovery Center to expand its pollinator garden (pictured in the left column). Public lands provide safe spaces and habitats for the pollinators. We rely on pollinators for our food and environmental ecosystem. The Appalachian Forest National Heritage Area wants to do its part in helping support these important creatures.
