AFNHA TOURISM DEVELOPMENT GRANT

AFNHA announced this week a new Tourism Development Grant available to governmental or non-profit organizations to enhance or create new tourist experience opportunities, network visitor opportunities together to create a larger attraction, and/or address challenges, such as from the COVID-19 pandemic, accessibility, or increasing the diversity of the stories told and/or the audience.



Grant requests can be from \$1000 up to \$5000. Recipients are expected to provide a local match (cash or in-kind) equal to 50% of the amount received. **Applications are due by March 1, 2022.**



Arthurdale Heritage has a number of ongoing projects to accompany the traveling Smithsonian exhibit Crossroads: Change in Rural America. The exhibit examines our understanding of rural places and their history. Arthurdale and the other sites in the state hosting the exhibit will be thinking about topics like mental health, labor, and community memory. They will also be discussing the representations of their communities and West Virginia. Often is portrayed as a state that is stuck in the past. That West Virginia is an isolated place, where people exclude and hurt others. With this in mind Crossroads asks a variety of questions like why should we revitalize rural places, why do rural communities matter, what can we do for the people who remain there, why do people leave, and what is our vision for the state's future?

We still have OPEN slots for the 2021-2022 AmeriCorps Term!







AFNHA AmeriCorps has been awarded a competitive AmeriCorps grant for 34 members for the 2021-2022 term, plus an additional 8 positions just awarded from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. In addition, the ARPA funding will raise member stipends to \$16,000 a year. This gives us a total program of 42 member positions, our largest ever. Because these additional funds were just awarded, we are still recruiting for a number of positions. While the new term starts September 8, we will continue recruiting through the fall until all positions are filled.
