AFNHA is announcing our 2023 sub-grant program for projects that support AFNHA goals within the 18 AFNHA counties.

Grant requests can be from \$1,000 up to \$20,000. Recipients must provide non-federal match (cash or inkind) at least equal to the amount received.

AFNHA invites applicants to begin work on proposals now. The formal application portal and Notice of Funding Opportunity will be available on Monday, **June 19th.** The project timeline is 1 year from Sept 2023-Sept 2024.

Spend the day in scenic Allegany County, Maryland learning about tourism industry tools and local examples of best practices. More info is coming soon!


America250

- 2) Developing projects to tell your America250 story. These may include a variety of project formats, such as research or oral history, digital, audio, or video products, interpretive signage, stationary or traveling exhibits, live programs, participation projects, youth projects, or preservation/conservation projects that include a storytelling aspect. America250 projects may be eligible for AFNHA sub-grants.


